

See something. Do something.

The current recommendations for doing an aspirate include generalities — recommend if a mass is changing in size or appearance, or bothering the patient. Owners are often told to keep an eye on it. But what does that mean? Keep an eye on it for how long? How much can it grow before we should do something?

We all must do better. We need guidelines. We must find tumors earlier when they are small. We must aspirate them. With the input of fellow specialists, I have developed See Something, Do Something:

See Something — If a dog or cat has a mass that is the size of a pea (1 cm) and it has been there one month ... Do Something — Go to a veterinarian and get it aspirated or biopsied.



Basic Fracture Repair Techniques

Long bone fractures occur commonly and repairing them may seem daunting. Continuing Education Credits

The 2017 CVC San Diego program has been submitted (but not yet approved) for a maximum of 36 hours of credit for veterinarians in full attendance and 29 hours of credit for technicians over four days in jurisdictions that recognize AAVSB's RACE approval. 
San Diego Weather: What to Wear


